 Project HOPE at Fresno City College whom serves foster youth in higher education

- The Richmond Health and Wellness Center opened in West Contra County – the first treatment facility of its kind to operate in that community since 2014
- The continued expansion of our Housing Services through the HUD Coordinated Entry System, Kaiser Permanente Navigation Services and Lesar/Anthem Blue Cross Assessment and Outreach programs
- The recent assumption of the Selma Emergency Shelter bringing us to a new part of Fresno County

Please know that these few accomplishments are just a glimpse into our further expansion of programs and services as we continually look for new ways to better our continuum of care for the people that we serve."

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(Continued from Page I) "To end the year on a high note, we recently received the biggest surprise of all. On December 9, WestCare California joined 42 other recipients across the nation in receiving funding on behalf of the Bezos Day I Families Fund. Our grant award totaled \$2.5 million to increase support of our efforts in assisting and securing permanent housing for individuals and families who are currently experiencing homelessness.

All of these accomplishments could not be reached without your individual contributions. To be successful in Uplifting the Human Spirit, we need everyone on our team. I know that 2020 has been challenging for us in a variety of different ways. From personal losses in our families to the restructuring of programming and services to ensure safety to the postponement or transition to a virtual format for our normal community events — it's been hard, but we remain resilient.

Around this time, she began receiving services from the Day Reporting Center and Opening Doors where we began linking her to community resources such as HIV services and virtual NA/AA groups. Diane was appreciative of us providing her with gas cards and a welcome/cleaning kit for her new apartment when she was housed this past September. She went on to refer her boyfriend, Christian, who graduated from MLK the same time as her and entered into our McKinney Plaza Recovery Residence for men not long after. The two are currently housed together, doing well and as of mid-December, are expecting a child of their own! # Health & Wellness Corner

"The Effects of Poverty in America" by Mark Leanhart, Program Director, Belmont Adult Outpatient



"January is Poverty Awareness Month and as poverty impacts wellness in many ways, I thought it was a great topic for examination and discussion. While in 2015, there were 43 million Americans living in poverty, COVID-19 has reportedly increased the numbers of Americans living in poverty by at least 6 million according to two new studies. Of course, poverty has a significant impact on society at large and on any community. Poverty can be cyclical in nature. For example, discrimination can contribute to individuals, families and communities living in impoverished conditions causing someone who is impoverished to then suffer from additional stigma and further discrimination, thus perpetuating a cycle of poverty. Poverty may result from income inequality, social exclusion and unemployment.

Food poverty and insecurity can result in a poor diet, which can then lead to poor health. Poor nutrition often results from poverty and is the leading cause of illnesses in the United States. Diet-related diseases are the leading cause of death in the U.S. The proportion of impoverished children not receiving any health care is twice that of higher income children. In short, impoverishment increases risk for mental illness, substance abuse, chronic disease, lower life expectancy and higher mortality rates.

While there are strategies that increase economic mobility such as Head Start, job training programs, the National School Lunch program, WIC, SNAP and Welfare, rising out of poverty can take many years and even generations. For many, education and multiple job households are the short-term pathway to overcoming poverty with continued career development being among the long-term solutions. Poverty is a complex problem that must ultimately be addressed through both public policy and community-based strategies. The framework for community-based poverty reduction consists of four key interventions: meeting basic needs such as access to food housing and utilities, removing barriers such as a lack of access to healthcare, childcare or fair employment opportunities, building skills ranging from career to life skills and promoting economic development by means of job creation and retention, self employment, access to capital and technical assistance."




